Hop, Skip and Jump on Down to Aullwood Farm!







2016: A Great Year for Butterflies at Aullwood

After butterfly populations rebounded in 2015, butterfly enthusiasts are happy to report similar numbers in 2016! During the 2016 monitoring season at Aullwood, 50 species were seen and 1,858 individual butterflies and skippers were observed (second highest numbers since 2012). The five most abundant species were Silverspotted Skippers, Cabbage Whites, Pearl Crescents, Eastern Tailed-Blues and Little Wood-Satyrs; these five species account for 59% of the total butterflies observed. Although overall numbers were slightly lower than 2015, we recorded increased numbers for the Swallowtail and Skipper species. We spotted 11 Giant Swallowtails, the most we have seen in the 16 years of our survey!

Unfortunately, Monarch sightings were much lower than in 2015. Only 4 Monarchs were spotted in 2016, the lowest number recorded in Aullwood's count history. Scientists attribute the reduced Monarch populations to harsh weather in overwintering sites in Mexico, as well as habitat loss in Mexico and the US due to development, herbicide use, genetically modified crops and mowing roadsides. Recent research indicates that the decline of Monarchs is most likely due to the destruction of milkweed in breeding areas, including Ohio. You can help Monarchs by planting native wildflowers — milkweeds for the caterpillars and a variety of wildflowers for the nectaring adults.

Thank you to all the butterfly aficionados who participated in this program. We appreciate all the time, energy and enthusiasm you have dedicated to collecting data on our dazzling butterflies. The butterfly monitoring program at Aullwood would not occur without your dedication!

If you love butterflies and want to help monitor their populations, then join Aullwood's Long Term Butterfly Monitoring (LTBM) team! Each week we walk a route through several different habitats at Aullwood and record the butterflies and skippers we encounter. Aullwood's data is compiled with data from other monitoring locations and scientists around the state to discern state-wide trends in butterfly populations, including changes in ranges, dates of appearance and the impacts of climate change.

Tiny Jeweled Wonders

It is absolutely remarkable that any birds migrate, but when you see the tiny size of a hummingbird you begin to realize it is astonishing that such a tiny creature can travel such long distances. Despite their size, hummingbirds are tough and resilient little birds with some migrating distances of more than

1000 miles! Not all hummingbirds migrate, but of those that do, many of them winter in Central America and journey to North America for the summer. Some hummingbirds travel across land but some choose to migrate across the Gulf of Mexico. This is a distance of more than 500 miles! That's approximately the distance between Dayton and Atlanta. Yet, some hummingbirds travel that span twice a year. Before they try such a feat they must double their weight or they won't have enough energy to cross this expansive body of water. To make the flight they must fly nonstop for 18-22 hours! Once they reach the coast they will have lost half their weight.

There are more than 350 species of hummingbirds in the world. The hummingbird we are most likely to see in Ohio is the Ruby-throated Hummingbird. Both males and females have a bright emerald-green body with gray-white underparts. The male Ruby-throated Hummingbird has a beautiful red-colored throat, while the females lack the red throat. Hummingbirds can fly at full speed then stop in an instant. They can also fly backwards and hover. A Ruby-throated Hummingbird's wings can beat about 53 times a second!

Male Ruby-throated Hummingbirds typically arrive about a week before females so they can start establishing their territories. Hummingbirds usually return to the same areas every year. They have excellent memories and can be seen hovering where a feeder had been the previous year but has since been moved. They fiercely defend their territories, often chasing off competitors. Once the females arrive, the males try to impress them by putting on a courtship display, flying back and forth in an arc pattern.

The male does not participate in nest building or feeding young. The female uses soft plant materials for the inside of the nest, lines the outside with lichen and binds the nest together with spider webs. The female typically lays 1-2 eggs and incubates them for about 16 days. The eggs are about the size of a jellybean. Young often leave the nest after about 20 days.

Ruby-throated Hummingbirds are most attracted to red and orange flowers where they sip nectar using their very long tongues. They also eat small insects like gnats, mosquitoes and fruit flies for protein. When migrating Ruby-throated Hummingbirds are faced with a lack of flowers or insects they search for holes drilled by Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers and sip tree sap until a better food source appears.

While Ohio's most common hummingbird is the Rubythroated Hummingbird, occasionally Rufous Hummingbirds will show up in Ohio. A few years ago two of Aullwood's volunteers, Dansen and Leanne Brown, had a Rufous Hummingbird visit their feeder (see photo). The Rufous Hummingbird is typically a western North American species but as with many birds, occasionally some show up outside their normal ranges.

If you would like to see hummingbirds in your yard, hang up hummingbird feeders in early April and plant hummingbird-friendly flowers in your garden. Be sure to wash out feeders

and make new food every couple of days before the water gets cloudy. The formula is one-quarter cup of sugar with one cup of water; it is not necessary to put red dye in the mixture. During hot weather, feeders need to be cleaned and changed frequently to avoid feeding hummingbirds fermented water which could be toxic to them. Another way to attract hummingbirds to your yard is by planting hummingbird friendly flowers like butterfly milkweed, royal catchfly, cardinal flower or wild bergamot — all of which can be purchased at Aullwood's Native Plant Sale.

I love watching hummingbirds throughout the summer and into the fall. Sometimes we get questions at Aullwood about how long feeders should be left out. You should keep feeders out as long as you see hummingbirds visiting them then keep them out about a week after seeing your last one just in case a straggler comes through. It is not true that keeping your hummingbird feeders up in the fall will prevent hummingbirds from migrating. The amount of food available to them does not affect their migratory urge, so please keep those feeders up as they are an important food source for these beautiful, tiny jeweled wonders!





A fun game of bird hide and seek

Wednesday, May 3 is Birdathon 2017. The goal is for teams to identify at least 125 different species of birds in a 24-hour period and raise \$15,000 for Aullwood. Last year teams and supporters exceeded the goal and raised a total of \$16,068!

Birdathon is a fun and unique way to raise funds to support Aullwood's education programs. Remember that in the 2015-16 school year, 120 schools, representing 13 counties and 22 public school districts were touched by Aullwood's hands-on programs! We need your help to raise funds so that the children we serve may continue to learn and experience nature and farming. There is a birding team for everyone, although you do not have to join a team to support Birdathon. You can become a Birdathon sponsor by simply filling out the pledge form below.

The Marie S. Aull Education Center is the starting point for most of Aullwood's Birdathon Teams to take flight on May 3rd.

• TEAM CARDINAL (Bird Watchers who raise \$100 in pledges) will gather at 7:00 a.m. in the Marie S. Aull Education Center. There will be a continental breakfast and a brief talk by a surprise guest leader. Our birding expert will lead Team Cardinal and

help us identify birds along Aullwood's many trails. This birding adventure ends at 9:00 a.m. Equipment needed: binoculars, walking shoes and a sense of adventure.

- TEAM WARBLER (Bird Watchers who raise \$200 in pledges) will depart at 6:00 a.m. for Spring Valley Wildlife Area and bird watch with co-leaders Nicole Conrad, Education Manager, Nenita Lapitan, Volunteer Coordinator, and Cheryl Johnson, Friends of Aullwood former board member. A box lunch will be provided at noon and the group will continue its bird count at other hot spots, returning to Aullwood by 4:00 p.m.
- TEAM TANAGER (Bird Watchers who raise \$300 in pledges) will depart at 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 2 and stay overnight at a hotel. (Aullwood will make the reservations participants will pay for their rooms.) The team will begin birding late in the afternoon and resume Birdathon adventures at 7:00 a.m. the next day. The team will visit many key birding sites which may include: Tar Hollow State Park, Magee Marsh, Killdeer Plains, Ottawa NWR and other areas along Lake Erie. Team Tanager, led by Tom Hissong, Aullwood's Retired Education Manager, will return to the Center by 9:30 p.m. This schedule is subject to change based on the weather.



Farming for Sustainability the Aullwood Way

Sustainability seems to be a catchall term these days. If we look to the Merriam-Webster Dictionary, it is defined as "of, relating to, or being a method of harvesting or using a resource so that the resource is not depleted or permanently damaged." Let's take it a step further to sustainable agriculture, which is largely undefined by the USDA or other verifying agencies. We must define what sustainable agriculture means to Aullwood in order to develop best practices, as well as to adapt to meet the challenges of an ever-changing environment.

We have defined sustainable agriculture as land management that produces food, fiber, plants, or animals using farming techniques that protect the environment, public health and farmers, and promotes animal welfare without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. As stewards of the land, we are responsible for making the best decisions we can to give to the land as it provides for us. Just as in any healthy relationship in life, we must not take more than we give. The demand for cheap farm products has put pressure on present day farmers to optimize their systems for quick returns and profits, compromising their commitment to long-term land productivity and resilience. We can't get caught up in this way of thinking if we want to conserve our resources. As humans, we function as part of an ecosystem, which must be recognized as a dynamic, complex community of living organisms. When we affect one component of that system, it does not happen in isolation.

For example, if we apply inorganic fertilizers, we may have higher crop yields that season. However, if we take off our instant gratification blinders and observe the impact on the rest of the system, we can't overlook that this off-farm input is a cost to the farm, and would disturb the balance of organisms (plant, mycorrhizal, bacterial, and animal) in the ecosystem. Just as a human's body is prone to infection and illness when undernourished, land is susceptible to disease and pest pressure.

How will we put these ideals into practice at Aullwood? We are committed to assessing and managing our soil, water, and animal health.

One practice we will incorporate is intensive rotational grazing, which mirrors the movement of wild prey animals. Just as the wild bison traversed the plains in mob fashion, moving quickly in tight-knit groups to avoid predation, so will we graze our cattle. The cows will move between small paddocks always leaving enough top growth for regeneration. This light, short-term disturbance to the soil will allow nutrients from the cow manure to fertilize the soil. Pigs and poultry on the farm are now being fed non-GMO feed. Why? Genetically modified crops are patented, meaning that they are owned by biotechnology corporations and not farmers.

This does not allow farmers to save seed, requiring them to buy new seed yearly, as well as threatening the autonomy of the independent farmer when neighboring crops cross-pollinate with their own non-GMO crops. Furthermore, the use of chemicals has grown with the use of herbicide-tolerant crops as weeds gain resistance to glyphosate products such as Roundup. This gives rise to superweeds which are changing our ecological landscape. In our cropping system, we focus on replenishing our soil with cover crops and our own compost. These amendments add organic matter to the soil, improving structure and water holding capacity while releasing nutrients into the soil






